## World Council of Churches Aids People Nobody Wants

SALZBURG, Austria (UPI) — "You want to know what the world refugee year is all about?" said Arthur Foster. "Come out to Camp Parsch and see for yourself."

We drove through the quaint, narrow streets of old Salzburg, past the house where Mozart composed his concertos, and out into the rolling Austrian countryside. At the foot of a small mountain, we came upon a bleak group of unpainted wooden barracks. The tarpaper roofs were tattered with leaky-looking patches. Many of the windows were broken. High weeds surrounded the barracks. The unpaved streets were sloughs of mud.

"Hitler built this place as a slave labor camp," said Foster. "It has deteriorated quite a bit since then."

**250 Live In Camp**

"There are about 250 refugees living in this camp," said Foster, a kindly, dedicated Englishman who heads the Austrian refugee work of the World Council of Churches. "Most of the adults have been here — or in other camps like this — for 14 years, since the end of the war. The children were born here and have never known any other life."

He parked in front of barracks 14 and led the way inside. His knock at the door of the first room was answered by a short, fat woman whom he introduced as Frau Dobgaiew. Foster spoke to her in German, and translated her story into English for me.

She was a Yugoslavian and was married to a Russian whom she had met in a Siberian labor camp. Somehow they had escaped to Austria at the end of the war. They had applied for emigration

The prelate and many of the pilgrims will travel by bus to the shrine which is on the site of the old Indian village of Ossernenon. It was there that the first American saints of the Roman Catholic Church were martyred in 1642.

Some of those making the pilgrimage will use their own cars, according to the announcement.

## Jacqueline Bloss Serving on Staff Of Church Group

## Ex-German Discovers U.S. Is Still a Land of Hope

NEW YORK (UPI) — Curt Thiele gets impatient with those who say the United States is no longer the land of opportunity. He should know. He came here from Germany as recently as 1952, and he started behind a pretty big eight-ball.

In just seven years, Thiele, 38, has become a star salesman for one of America's top insurance companies, earning an annual salary in five figures.

"It couldn't have happened any place else in the world," Thiele says.

The slightly built, energetic young German's personal eight-ball was the fact that he fought for the Nazis, as a corporal in the German Afrika Corps. Before making the grade here, he had to live down his past.

Thiele was captured twice by the British in North Africa. The first time he escaped and walked back, masquerading as an Arab. The second time he was shipped to a prisoner-of-war camp in this country, and was held two years.

It was as a prisoner that Thiele decided America was the place for him.

Thiele, a promising young soccer star when he entered the German army in 1940, had studied English in school, so he had that much of an advantage when he was sent to the United States as a POW.

But what particularly "astonished and delighted" him was the informality and friendliness of the Americans he came up against. "Even the lieutenant called me Curt, which no German officer ever did," he recalls.

By the time he was sent back to Germany in 1945, Thiele was thoroughly sold on the U.S.

For seven years, he worked as an interpreter, chief clerk and professional soccer player in his home town of Hamburg — "the pay was sufficient and there was much prestige," he says. But just before Christmas of 1952, he

## Georgian Buried Standing Upright

WASHINGTON, Ga. (UPI) — Capt. Abraham Simons, a wealthy Georgian who fought in the Revolutionary War, was buried six miles east of this town in a standing position with his rifle beside him "to fight the Devil."

Although Simons fought valiantly during the War of Independence, he also played another, quieter role in the history of Georgia. Shortly after his death, his widow was married to the Rev. Jesse Mercer, who used Simons' large estate to found Mercer University in Macon.

Thus, Mercer, a Baptist school, was founded with money that was provided indirectly by a Jew.
